A Note from Pastor Nathan

Understand this, my dear brothers and sisters: You must all be quick to listen, slow to speak, and slow to get angry.

Human anger does not produce the righteousness God desires.

James 1:19-20, NLT

We all have a deep desire for things to be right. While we may have different ideas about what exactly "right" means, I think this is a God-given desire. We read it in Micah 6:8. We recite it in the Pledge of Allegiance. It is a good thing to want liberty and justice for all.

When "right" isn't happening, we may find ourselves getting angry. There is nothing necessarily wrong about being angry, although anger can manifest in destructive ways (Eph. 4:26-27). Anger may be a good sign, if I am angry about something that is truly wrong in the sight of God.

But anger itself does not produce righteousness. *The road to righteousness actually starts with listening*. Be quick to listen, James implores us. That is how the pursuit of God's righteousness begins.

Consider the value of listening in a sharply polarized world. I don't personally know what it is like:

- To be black in America;
- To serve as a law enforcement officer;
- To suffer with severe COVID-19 illness or to lose a loved one to that illness;
- To be a public health official, governor, or president;
- To struggle with my gender identity or sexual orientation;
- To serve on the Supreme Court;
- To be a member of the news media.

Obviously, I have chosen to name groups of people who are at the center of current controversies. I have opinions about these matters; maybe you do as well. But as I think about my opinions, I find that I know very little about what life is actually like for the people most deeply affected by these issues.

Listening might help me to understand another person's perspective. Listening might not prompt or require me to change my mind, but it just might shape my heart. I might gain new appreciation for the person with whom I disagree. I might grow in humility regarding my own perspective. It might be that listening isn't as much for the forming of my mind as for the shaping of my heart. I might become more grateful for my situation in life, and develop more compassion and empathy for those whose lives are harder than mine.

And in my listening, I might hear God. All people are created in God's image. All people are people for whom Christ died. As I listen to people who are valuable to God, I might catch a fresh glimpse of God's heart, for them and for me.

So as our Lord Jesus exhorts us, let's consider carefully how we listen (Luke 8:18). There might be a book to read, a film to watch, a conversation to initiate, in which I can deliberately listen to someone whose life experience I know very little about.

In our listening, the Holy Spirit might speak. And we might become better equipped to "do justice, love mercy, and walk humbly with our God" and to "love our neighbors as ourselves." It might begin with listening.
