A Note from Pastor Nathan

When Job's three friends, Eliphaz the Temanite, Bildad the Shuhite and Zophar the Naamathite, heard about all the troubles that had come upon him, they set out from their homes and met together by agreement to go and sympathize with him and comfort him. When they saw him from a distance, they could hardly recognize him; they began to weep aloud, and they tore their robes and sprinkled dust on their heads. Then they sat on the ground with him for seven days and seven nights. No one said a word to him, because they saw how great his suffering was. Job 2:11-13 (NIV '84)

In recent months, I have attended two seminars focusing on the topic of grief. A few of you were able to participate in these events with me. Both gatherings were well attended. It is evident that many people sincerely want to help those who are grieving but don't always know what is best to say or do. I offer to you some of the below observations as we all seek to be God's healing instruments in the lives of those we love.

1. It is better to focus on *being present* and *listening well* than "what to say." Job's friends started out well (above) when they showed up and listened and cried with him. They did worse when they started talking!

2. A grief counselor who presented one seminar said she continues to make mistakes. *The risk of loving those who are grieving requires a willingness to make mistakes and learn.* None of us always says the perfect thing.

3. Some clichés minimize the feelings of the grieving person. For example: "*At least* he's in a better place." "*At least* she's not suffering." But the grief may still be great! Offer empathy; don't force your perspective.

4. Tell the truth! "I'm so sorry." "We are praying for you." "We love you." Those statements are honest, loving, and they don't attempt to fix anything. Express love to the person in ways appropriate to him/her.

5. Don't defend God. God can handle any person's anger. It is more blessed to listen than to teach theology.

6. Tears are good! This idea of "being strong" during times of grief is foolish. It is healthy to weep together!

7. Be sensitive that the bereaved person's relationship with the deceased may have been different than yours was. Your grief of a good relationship lost might be their grief for a relationship that never was very good.

8. You and I may understand loss, and we may have suffered very similar losses, but we *never* know exactly how someone else feels. Therefore, we must *not* say, "I know exactly how you feel." We simply don't know.

9. Express care and listen well in the months and years following a person's loss, not just in the days after the funeral. Give the gift of a safe space to vent or tell stories. Storytelling can be healing for the grieving person.

10. Give the bereaved person the gift of choices. S/he did not get to choose that the loved one died. But s/he can choose what activities to participate in, which conversations to have, and when. Be gracious and patient.

I'm interested in hearing from you. If you are walking through a journey of grief, what has been helpful? What has been hurtful? We can learn a lot from one another by sharing stories. If you are seeking support for your grief journey, please let me know. There are a few resources I might be able to point you toward, if helpful.

We take great comfort that our Lord Jesus entered into our world of suffering and pain. He is *God with us* in the midst of sorrow. He is close to the brokenhearted. I pray that, wherever you are in your journey, you would sense His closeness and compassion as you read these words. Jesus loves you so very much.


