A NOTE FROM PASTOR NATHAN

One generation will commend your works to another...
Psalm 145:4

I am asking you to pray about youth ministry. In the Reshaping Church journey we have participated in this year, the single most dominant theme from your feedback is that FBC needs a renewed focus on ministry to youth. This is a good thing! But if we're going to move from vision to reality on this front, two things must happen...

First, we must involve youth in the vision-casting and implementation process. Most of us reading this article spent most of our youth in a different century. We would do well to listen to those who are currently youth today.

Second, we must embrace an approach to youth ministry that involves all of us, the church as a whole. In other words, the question is not, "Who can we get to work with youth?" but rather, "How can we all minister to youth?"

The answers to that last question might be more varied and exciting than you think.

Liz and I are leading the junior-senior high Sunday school class right now. We have invited several of you to come share testimonies with the youth. We will keep asking more of you! You could read this and volunteer! Telling the story of your faith journey will be a blessing to you as well as our students. Just ask anyone who has come to share so far.

There is interest among the youth themselves in the resurrection of some kind of "youth group" beyond what we are able to do on Sunday mornings. That will require leadership, whether paid or volunteer. You could be one of those leaders. Again, we need youth to help set the vision of what this looks like. But we need adults to give time.

If that kind of commitment is too daunting, we could really use some adults to lead some fun, random social activities with the students. If this idea excites you, I'd encourage you to take the first step of dropping in on Sunday school and asking the youth what kinds of activities they want to do. This doesn't have to be complicated or expensive. It could be one-time only. And you could be a person who simply offers the use of your property or pays for the pizza.

Up to now, everything I've written about addresses the youth who are already participating in the ministries of FBC. But the majority of youth ministry opportunities are – and always will be – outside the walls of our church building.

Our community has need of CASAs (Court Appointed Special Advocates) to support youth who are stuck in the legal system to deal with issues related to their custody and care. Local schools need substitute teachers, tutors, and mentors. You could be a loving, adult presence in the life of some students who have no such presence at home.

Organizations like Erin's Purpose and Open Arms need volunteers in a variety of capacities, some of which don't even involve meeting directly with students. The Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts, Girl Scouts, and 4-H need leaders and volunteers.

Youth sports leagues need coaches and officials. On a conference call this morning, the presenter shared that she had long complained about all of the youth sports that took kids away from church. Then she and her husband decided to start coaching soccer, and instantly they had way more opportunities to minister to youth than ever before.

Then of course, there is the tremendous value of striking up conversations with youth. There was a man who stationed himself near the doorway every Sunday at the church I grew up in, and he would always ask me about cross country and track. He had read the paper! He knew something about my life and he cared enough to ask. These conversations are more valuable than you might think. You might even send a text message or write a note. Communicate you care.

All youth ministry requires prayer. I know that everyone reading this article can do that. Please pray for us as we navigate the way forward into whatever new horizons of youth ministry the Lord has in store for us. And please ask the Lord what your role might be in that journey.
