### One Great Hour of Sharing



### A NOTE FROM PASTOR NATHAN

In putting everything under him, God left nothing that is not subject to him. Yet at present we do not see everything subject to him. But we see Jesus, who was made a little lower than the angels, now crowned with glory and honor because he suffered death, so that by the grace of God he might taste death for everyone.

Hebrews 2:8b-9 (NIV '84)

It is the last full week in May. I'm in the midst of studying Hebrews 2:5-9, which is an exposition of Psalm 8, declaring the victory of Jesus. I'm preparing for Sunday's sermon on Psalm 72:8-11, the source for the hymn, "Jesus Shall Reign." These scriptures and songs declare that King Jesus has overcome all things and has authority over all things and will be vindicated as King over everything and everyone forever. This is gloriously good news!

The news in our world, however, seems irreparably bad. War, poverty, and sudden violence. What do we say in response to horrors such as grocery store shootings and elementary school massacres? To the families, I have few words beyond, "I'm so sorry." In prayer, I have few words beyond, "Lord, have mercy!" and, "Come, Lord Jesus!" What might the Holy Spirit have to say to us, as we try to make sense of senseless sorrow?

The Lord led me to hymn #377, "Alleluia! Sing to Jesus." Consider the lyrics of William C. Dix (FBC CCLI #108619):

Alleluia! Sing to Jesus!
His the scepter, His the throne.
Alleluia! His the triumph,
His the victory alone.
Hark! the songs of peaceful Zion
Thunder like a mighty flood
Jesus out of every nation
Has redeemed us by His blood.

Alleluia! not as orphans
Are we left in sorrow now.
Alleluia! He is near us;
Faith believes, nor questions how.
Tho' the clouds from sight received Him
When the forty days were o'er,
Shall our hearts forget His promise:
"I am with you ever more"?

Alleluia! Bread of Heaven, You on earth our food and stay! Alleluia! here the sinful Flee to You from day to day. Intercessor, Friend of sinners, Earth's Redeemer, plead for me, Where the songs of all the sinless Sweep across the crystal sea.

Much could be said about this victory song, but the phrase that captivates my attention is this – "Alleluia! not as orphans are we left in sorrow now." In sorrows, for a little while, we are left (1 Peter 1:6). But we are not left alone!

This brings us back full circle to the final phrase of **Hebrews 2:9**, "he suffered death, so that by the grace of God he might taste death for everyone." We were already destined to taste death, the wages which our fraudulent master, Mr. Sin, pays us (**Romans 6:23**). And that would have been the end of us. Jesus enters into death, not deserving it of course, and tastes it for us. Having gone through death, He comes out permanently alive, offering us permanent life in God's new world, the great salvation which we will inherit (**Heb. 1:14-2:5; 1 Pet. 1:3-5**).

In order to do this, Jesus tasted death personally. The taste of death is horrible. Many of us have tasted the death of someone we loved dearly. We've tasted tragic and horrible deaths in the news from around the world. Death does not taste pleasant at all! Jesus knows what death tastes like. Keep in mind, Jesus did not taste death the way you or I might taste a sample food item at the grocery store. Jesus tasted it fully, completely, to the end.

This means that Jesus has tasted Uvalde and Buffalo and Nairobi and Ukraine and any other places where violence, poverty, and war are wafting the fragrance of death. Jesus in His unfathomable love has tasted all of these places, and He tasted all of them on the cross. When we taste death, we taste what He has tasted for us, in order to set us free.

Among the many things we can remember when we encounter the horrible taste of death, is this: "Jesus knows what this tastes like." We are tasting that which He already tasted on our behalf, so that it might not be the final taste in our mouths. That doesn't take away all of the pain or answer many of the difficult questions. But somehow it helps. Jesus knows the taste of this terrible sorrow. We do not grieve as orphans. We grieve in the company of the coming King.
