
Give thanks to the Lord for His unfailing love and His wonderful deeds. Psalm 107:8

To God be the Glory

Author: Fanny Crosby (1875)
Tune: TO GOD BE THE GLORY (Doane)

Fanny (Francis) Jane Crosby attended the New York City School for the Blind, where she later became a teacher. She began writing poetry when she was eight and publishing several volumes, such as *A Blind Girl, and Other Poems* (1844). Married to musician Alexander Van Alstyne, who was also blind, Crosby began writing hymn texts when she was in her forties. She published at least eight thousand hymns (some under various pseudonoyms); at times she was under contract to her pubisher to write three hymns a week and often wrote six or seven a day. Crosby's texts were set to music by prominent gospel song composers such as William B. Bradbury, William H. Doane, Robert S. Lowry, Ira D. Sankey, and William J. Kirkpatrick. Her hymns were distributed widely and popularized at evangelistic services in both America and Great Britain. Crosby was one of the most respected women of her era and the friend of many prominent persons, including presidents of the United States.

Mission Moment

In June, we spotlight Bahrain. It is a small island nation located in West Asia. It is one of the world's chief producing regions, but it has relatively small petroleum resources.

Less than 1% of native Bahrainis are Christians; nearly all are Muslims. Christians among Bahrain's expatriate workers make up 8 percent of the population. There is no tolerance for conversion away from Islam. Families and local communities are the main persecutors, but the government occasionally imprisons or harasses a new Christian. Christian converts risk their jobs and social status. Nevertheless, some still gather in secret to worship.

Voice of the Martyrs support evangelists by distributing Bibles and other Christian literature to encourage new believers. Please remember to pray for the people of Bahrain to stay strong in their faith.





NOTE FROM NATHAN

"My soul is overwhelmed with sorrow to the point of death."

Jesus, Mark 14:34



On a recent Sunday, I said that inspiration works in different ways. This is true for the Bible, for any sermon, and for these newsletter articles.

I had the privilege of attending an event at Erin's Purpose on Wednesday night to meet a couple of local, Christian counselors. Gretchen Childress serves out of Odon, and Paul Alvey is based in Jasper. Both will be receiving referrals from Erin's Purpose to work with students in need of counseling services.

My purpose in going was to meet some local counselors to whom I can refer people as needed. There is a lack of quality, Christian counseling in rural, southern Indiana. To meet two, competent, approachable counselors who are already trusted by a ministry I trust is huge.

That was Wednesday. Two days later, I open my email to find a message from the IU Center for Rural Engagement, with an article and a podcast about mental health in rural Indiana. While I don't have a resource to pass along to you (at least not yet), there is a group working to provide more extensive Christian counseling services to more people in our region.

The article highlighted some of the challenges to receiving mental health care in southern Indiana. One is the availability of counselors. Another is travel. Cost also can be a hindrance. Work is being done to lower those hurdles.

But perhaps the biggest challenge, from my standpoint, is the stigma associated with mental health care. Christians especially can be ashamed to admit mental health issues or to seek care for those illnesses because we think it means there is something wrong with us, or something inadequate about our faith. We think that we shouldn't be struggling with these things. But the reality is, whether we admit it or not, we often are.

If you are a Christian and you suffer from depression or anxiety or PTSD or any other mental health challenge, it doesn't mean there is anything wrong with your faith. It means you are *human*. We are human beings. These kinds of experiences are part of the brokenness we share. The article I read today reminds us that our brains are organs, and just like any other organ in our bodies, there are appropriate and necessary times to seek medical treatment for healing.

The quote above is but a sampling of the experience of Jesus, who entered into all of our suffering and pain, including the depths of depression itself. He knows our anguish (Isa. 53:4). To be absolutely overwhelmed by the circumstances of life is common to humanity, and therefore common to the experience of our Lord Jesus during his walk on this earth. He feels our pain, including our mental pain. It is not some strange category of human existence to which he cannot relate. He was tried in all of the ways that we are (Heb. 4:15).

If you experience anxiety or depression, or if a traumatic event (or series of events) has happened in your life, it might be a good time to speak up. I am, of course, glad to meet and pray with any of you about anything. Those kinds of conversations can be helpful. There are limits, however, to what I am able to do. I received some training in pastoral care, but I am not a mental health professional. In addition to the two counselors I met last week, there are other options out there. I would be happy to help connect you with resources to help you in your mental health journey.

More than anything, you do not need to walk your journey alone. There are many of us who love Jesus and who love you and who would be honored to pray with you and support you on a path to healing. There is no shame in pursuing conversations or treatment for real pain in your life. There is no category of healing that Jesus is disinterested in.

"Little ones to Him belong; we are weak, but He is strong." Acknowledging our weakness might just be the first step in experiencing the Lord's strength in new and transformative ways (Isa. 40:28-31; 2 Cor. 12:9-10).
